Lessons Learned

Our last newsletter heralded Phase Three in the return to recovery. We are now on the verge of slipping back into phase two, or worse, unless we all do our part to ensure that does not happen.

We seem to have adopted the part about wearing face masks when shopping and when it is not possible to physically distance. This is a good thing.

Where we did not do a good job was avoiding gatherings, period! Once the concept of circles evolved, things seemed to spiral out of control. Somehow, we lost the concept that my circle and your circle were not supposed to be combined. Nor did we do a good job at communicating to the younger generation that they too had to be socially responsible.

As the numbers increased for gathering inside and outside, the spread, not surprisingly, began to rise. However, it was still low enough to allow schools to re-open and a small sense of normality to return to some households. Many, however, are still dealing with home schooling to avoid the potential for bringing home the dreaded virus to family who may not survive the disease.

My children made the decision that all five of my grandchildren were going to return to school. I supported their decision, as I personally believed that going to school is important for emotional health, not to mention the education itself. However, I also realize that this has put

family gatherings in jeopardy, but with some planning and some precautions, they can be possible. This will of course be dependant on what the Provincial Health Advisors have to say about a family "unit".

To me, the family unit means the immediate family. It does not include the aunts, uncles, cousins, and family friend—it certainly does not include bringing grandma who lives in a nursing home. If there are more than three cars in your driveway that are not being driven by those in your household, you are probably over the guidelines.

This year, our Christmas dinner might be served at four distanced tables, and the presents may be opened with everyone being physically distanced and wearing masks—but it would still be Christmas!

This will, however, depend on all of us doing our part to bring down the curve. Let's do our best to avoid another lock down and the devastating results.

We have already been there and done that, let's move forward. RW

and not COVID 19. • Place your treats in a basket or bowl at your door and let the children select the treats, maintain your distance, and wear a mask. Don't forget to wipe down the doorknobs and doorbells at the end of the night.

- Avoid crowded doorsteps. One family at a time. This is not a year for taking your children around with your neighbours.
- Parents should bring hand sanitizers along and use it every few doors.
- Before your children go out, pack a bag of goodies that they can eat for the next few days while the collected treats are in quarantine.
- When the children return home, place the night's haul in the garage, or out of reach for 48 hours. Research indicates that the virus cannot survive longer than this period of time. Afterwards, the treats should be safe.

Watch for any Public Health advisories with regard to Halloween. If it's still on, have a safe and happy Halloween. RW

A Disappointed Senior

A few days ago, a Rockwood Village resident came over to me and said, "It's going to be easier to drag my cart to Food Basics. They're finally constructing a sidewalk down that steep path reserved for cars only." She was referring to the east entrance to Rockwood Mall off Bough Beeches. Residents on the east side of Bough Beeches (between Maple Ridge and Rathburn) who do not drive use this



entrance to the mall rather than walk all the way to Rathburn on the north side of the mall, or to Burnhamthorpe Road on the south side of the mall; both are rather long distances for pedestrians carrying a load of groceries. It is shorter than using the other entrances, but it is steep, slippery in winter and really does not provide safe access for pedestrians.

After my encounter with the resident, I drove to the referred spot where I met two hydro workers and I asked them if in fact there was going to be a new sidewalk laid there. Unfortunately, their response was that they were repairing existing underground cables, and those cables negate any possibility of a sidewalk.

On closer examination I noted that, at one time, there must have been some thought about providing a pedestrian entrance to the mall at this site.

On the opposite side of where they are burying the hydro cable you will clearly note from the picture that the sidewalk, if completed, would provide pedestrians a safer walk to Rockwood Mall. It would simply require continuing the approaching piece of sidewalk that ends at the top of that lane.



Can the City do something to rectify this long-standing thorn in the side of the local residents? It may be that this entrance to the mall is on private property. If so, why can't the owners be persuaded to provide a safe pedestrian access to the mall, just as the other accesses (on the west side at Dixie Road and on the north side at Rathburn Road) clearly provide sidewalks on either side of the road entrances?

"Let's Remember our Masks! Especially at Crowded Playgrounds!"

At the time of writing this article, it's a warm autumn afternoon and I'm walking from my home in Rockwood Village to pick up my kids at Sts. Martha and Mary School. The school has been working very hard in making sure all students are social distanced from one another in the schoolyard, released from school in staggered format, and most importantly, students are wearing their masks. Ontario's Ministry of Education mandated masks for ALL children from grades 1 to Grade 12. This is to ensure that, if students cannot properly distance from one another, they have the added protection of masks to slow the spread of Covid-19.

As I looked around at the parents in this designated pick up zone on school property, I noticed that almost all parents were wearing masks. This is great because every parent seems to not only be following the rules but also following the guidelines of Peel Public Health, which reads "wear a non-medical mask where maintaining physical distancing is difficult...." (peelregion.ca/coronavirus/ prevention/) However, steps away from the school is Bough Beeches Park. At this park, there is a playground;



and when you look at these young people's eyes, there is excitement and happiness because the new rigors and reality of school have prevented these children to do what children are supposed to do-run free!

As my kids and I started walking home, I noticed that many children at Bough Beeches Park removed their masks and ran to the various play structures at the crowded

playground next door to the school. Children playing at a playground is excellent because playgrounds promote exercise and getting fresh air; but I couldn't help see the irony of this almost total disregard to social distancing and mask wearing. In this crowded playground of what looked like about 50 kids, only approximately 3 or 4 had their masks on. This is a major concern!

Every parent knows that social distancing is almost impossible, especially after kids get out of the confines of school at 3:30. However, the lack of wearing masks during a global pandemic cannot be condoned. Furthermore, there is research on the Federal Government website that states that mask wearing cuts down significantly the spread of coronavirus! With the daily numbers skyrocketing, today for example (September 22), the case numbers have risen to 478 in Ontario. Parents, please remember to mask your children in a crowded playground. At this point, there is no law in Ontario to prevent people from not wearing a mask outside, but we in Rockwood Village have been doing a great job in slowing down the spread of coronavirus! So let's remember to mask the kids in crowded playgrounds! It will save lives.... RW

Since there was not, and probably will never be, any interest from our neighbors to the east to "bridge" the Creek, now Rathburn Road, east of Ponytrail, is a dinosaur.

The only purpose this road to "nowhere" has served over the years is that it makes a great "drag strip." With the change in the seasons, and windows now open at night, the roar of the engines has brought the decades old issue to the forefront again.

The City has plans to redevelop this stretch of road. If you witness any aggressive or dangerous driving, you can now report such incidents, online, directly to Peel Police at: peelpolice.ca and select "road watch". This is a community initiative to allow residents to report infractions such as excessive speeds, failure to stop for school busses

and running red lights or stop signs. The offender's licence number is not required. If you do have the licence plate, call Peel Police directly at 905-453-3311. RW

Mandatory Face Covering By-law

Wearing a face covering or face mask in indoor public spaces is required under a City By-law until January 20, 2021. You must also wear a face covering or face mask while using MiWay Transit. Your face covering or face mask should:

- · Be easy to breathe through
- Be at least two layers of tightly woven cotton or linen
- · Cover the nose, mouth and chin without gaping
- Fit securely to the head with ties or ear loops
- · Maintain its shape after washing and drying

Tips to Prepare your Home for Winter NOW

- Keep gutters clear of fall leaves, twigs and acorns to keep snow and ice from flowing freely, which can cause clogging gutters which can lead to water damage to your home and termite nesting.
- Turn off and drain outside taps, turning off water from inside your home. Consider covering with an insulating cover, if you don't have a turn-off valve inside.
- Power wash outside patios, decks and walkways to remove "summer"dirt.
- Wash windows,inside and outside, inspect seals. Caulk where necessary. Remove screens (optional)
- Plan snow removal BEFORE the first snowstorm arrives.
- Buy ice melt BEFORE the ice arrives. (Pet friendly where possible) It is recommended

to use sand for traction instead of salt on new concrete.

• Cut grass to at least 4 inches to protect from snow. Apply a winter fertilizer to lawns to

encourage thicker root growth.

- Drain and blow out irrigation systems.
- Protect shrubs. Install burlap covers around cold-sensitive shrubs, especially those near roads to protect from road salt damage.
- Have Deer? Treat plants with your favorite deer repellent such as a spray that contains egg yolks because deer dislike protein.
- Let grasses stand. Don't prune ornamental grasses until spring. If you cut it back in fall, snow, ice and cold may damage the crown.
- Mow over leaves and let them decompose in place. Or bag chopped leaves with your mower and use them as mulch or add to your compost pile.

More Bumps in the Road?

There is no doubt that the "traffic calming" measures implemented on Fieldgate have been effective. There is less traffic, and speed has been reduced.

Unless you are willing to lose the underbody of your car, it is impossible to take the speed bumps over 30 km/ hr. If you are new to the area and take the first hump just south of Bough Beeches at the posted speed, you are in for a big surprise. If you were travelling a little faster, it is not inconceivable that surprise might result in loss of control of

The fact that there is less traffic may point to defensive driving measures. In order to avoid the speed bumps, many drivers are taking alternate routes and in so doing have actually diverted traffic to other routes, primarily Bough Beeches.

The "traffic calming" on Bough Beeches is an entirely different situation. These bumps, in front of Sts. Martha and Mary School are not slowing the traffic. They only present an obstacle to motorists who now just negotiate around them. This practice could actually make them dangerous in a school zone.

On September 21, Councillor Fonseca announced a public engagement session with regard to "traffic calming" along Bough Beeches Blvd. According to the diagrams



provided, the project would place speed bumps at regular intervals from Rathburn Road, across Fieldgate and ending at Burnhamthorpe. We are including the proposed diagrams; however, for clarity you might want to check this out by viewing the proposal at: www.chrisfonseca.ca -Traffic Calming Bough Beeches Blvd.

Park By-Law Revised

The City has recently updated the Parks By-law. Here are the highlights and changes for those who use the parks, leash free zones or trails in our neighbourhood:



- Parks will be open from dawn to 11 p.m.
- Children under 12 years of age are not allowed to enter Leash-Free Zones.
- Commercial dog walkers with an approved permit can use Leash-Free Zones Monday to Friday between the hours of 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. only.
- Smoking and vaping are prohibited in all public outdoor spaces. Additional to these changes are the Covid-19 rules that include wearing a face mask when it is not possible to be physically distanced, this is particularly important in the playgrounds.
